They have a commitment to try and make the world a better place." – Archbishop Desmond Tutu²

Desmond Mpilo Tutu is born in Klerksdorp, near Johannesburg on October 7, 1936. One of the world's best known advocates for peace and reconciliation, Archbishop Tutu travelled to Cyprus several times to encourage reconciliation between Greek Cypriot and Turkish Cypriot communities; to Israel and the occupied Palestinian territories to promote a just and secure Middle East peace; to Côte d'Ivoire, where the Elders encouraged national reconciliation following the post-election violence of early 2011; to Sudan and South Sudan to highlight humanitarian needs and the importance of dialogue between political leaders; In 2014, he joined an Elders delegation to Iran, meeting President Rouhani and key Iranian figures to promote peaceful solutions to conflict and sectarian divisions in the region.

Anti-apartheid archbishop

Desmond Tutu began his career as a high school teacher but turned to theology after the 1953 Bantu Education Act enforced racial segregation in all educational institutions in South Africa.

He was ordained as an Anglican priest in 1960, becoming the first black Anglican Dean of Johannesburg in 1975 and the first black General Secretary of the South African Council of Churches four years later. An outspoken critic of the apartheid government, he insisted that racial segregation was against God's will. He soon became well-known internationally for his commitment to non-violence and support for economic sanctions against apartheid South Africa.

Desmond Tutu was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1984 "for his role as a unifying leader figure in the non-violent campaign to resolve the problem of apartheid in South Africa." In 1986 he was elected Archbishop of Cape Town, the highest position in the Anglican Church in South Africa. Widely regarded as

'South Africa's moral conscience', he continued to speak out against the apartheid regime and organised many peaceful demonstrations with thousands marching beside him.

Truth and reconciliation

In 1994, after the end of apartheid and the election of Nelson Mandela as President of South Africa, Desmond Tutu was appointed Chair of South Africa's Truth and Reconciliation Commission to investigate apartheid-era crimes. The model he established was based on truth as a foundation for forgiveness and reconciliation and became central in healing South Africa's divided society. Archbishop Tutu believes that: “without forgiveness there can be no future for a relationship between individuals or within and between nations.”

Tutu retired as Chair of the Commission in 1998 and has since shared his experience and advice with those undertaking their own truth and reconciliation processes in post-conflict societies, from Northern Ireland to the Solomon Islands.

Advocate for peace and justice

Desmond Tutu remained a passionate critic of injustice. Despite announcing his retirement from public life in 2010, he continues to stand up for those who are poor and oppressed, to raise awareness of global crises such as the AIDS pandemic and climate change, and to advance peace and reconciliation worldwide. Oct. 7, 2021 - Frail, in a wheelchair, Tutu attends his 90th birthday celebration at St. George's Cathedral in Cape Town. Tutu dies in Cape Town on December 26, 2021.



What is Epiphany? Epiphany is a church festival celebrated every January 6 that commemorates the coming of the Magi as the first manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles or, in the Eastern Church, the commemoration of the baptism of Christ.

Afghan Refugee Support

The church council has voted to start a campaign to collect items to support the Afghan refugees in Wisconsin. Here is the list of items needed:

- Socks and underwear for men, women, and children in all sizes.
- New or very gently used and clean winter coats and hats for men and women, sizes small and medium. Please note: we are unable to accept any other clothing at this time. (LSS)
- Toiletries kits*: personal items such as shampoo, soap, toothpaste/toothbrushes.
- Kitchen kits*: pots and pans, tableware, mixing bowls, etc.
- Cleaning supplies kits*: dish soap, laundry detergent, sponges.
- Linens kits: bath towels, sheets, blankets.

The deadline for collecting the items above is **January 31, 2022**. We will be asking for volunteers to assemble the kits. We will drop them at LSS Refugee Resettlement Office in Milwaukee, WI. If you are giving a monetary donation, please make your check payable to “Immanuel Lutheran Church” with LSS in the memo.

*These individual kits will be securely packaged as individual kits.



U.S. TORNADOES

On the night of Dec. 10, a devastating outbreak of more than 30 tornadoes swept through six states. Kentucky was impacted the most, with more than 70 people reported dead. Homes and businesses were destroyed, including a candle factory in Mayfield, Ky., where first responders are still searching for survivors. More

than 330,000 people are without electricity across multiple states. The full extent of the damage is expected to become clear in the coming days.

Lutheran Disaster Response is engaging with partners in the affected areas, including the Indiana-Kentucky Synod, to respond to immediate needs. Given the initial damage assessments, recovery will likely take years, and Lutheran Disaster Response is prepared to accompany survivors until the response is complete.

Gifts to Lutheran Disaster Response designated for “U.S. tornadoes” will be used entirely (100%) to assist those affected by tornadoes until the response is complete. Together, we can support those who are on the long road to recovery. Please give today.

WHEN IMMANUEL PAID SOME PROPERTY TAXES

Last month many members of Immanuel received property tax bills from their local municipal and town governments. It has always been the policy in the United States that religious organizations are exempt from paying taxes on their property. This exemption periodically has been questioned by some in our country. Aware of the potential unfairness of this exemption, Immanuel contributed \$250 in lieu of property taxes to the City of Wausau in the 1970s. Pastor Hoven suggested this to a council meeting in April, 1970. It was felt that the congregation gained the benefit of fire and police protection without paying

anything in return. Immanuel was the first church in Wausau to do this. This contribution was discontinued, however, sometime near the end of the decade.

Adult Forum in Emmaus Room at 10:30 am

The Sin of White Supremacy Christianity, Racism, and Religious Diversity in America by Jeannine Hill Fletcher

How have Christian theologies of religious superiority underwritten ideologies of white supremacy in the United States? According to Hill Fletcher, the tendency of Christians to view themselves as the "chosen ones" has often been translated into racial categories as well. In other words, Christian supremacy has historically lent itself to white supremacy, with disastrous consequences.

How might we start to disentangle the two? Hill Fletcher proposes educational strategies that will help foster racial healing in America, the first of which is to demand of white Christians that they accept their responsibility for racist policies and structural discrimination in America.

Members absent: VP Maggie Westaby, Education Judy Nickolai and Properties Bob Henning.

Devotions were led by Adam about a friend that recently passed away. The person was respected and looked up to but he was a humble man. He had struggles but handled them with grace and dignity. His last post was a prayer of gratitude. He was thankful for what he had and what he was spared from. This is the day the Lord has made. Let us rejoice and be glad in it. The meeting was called to order at 6:09 p.m. by Adam Doede.

Church Office Report:

- Synod Women’s gathering was held.

A notice will be placed in the bulletin. Items will be delivered to LSS in Milwaukee by the office in Wausau sponsored by local churches and other organizations.
- Last confirmation class for the semester will be held this week.
- Thanksgiving service will be held at Immanuel
- The first advent service is Sunday, November 28.
- We are looking for suggested topics for Bible Study.
- Microphone – will need a new microphone at a cost of \$80. Motion made by Rick Lohr to purchase. 2nd by Patti.
- Maggie's office has bad internet connection and it would cost \$200 to extend the internet. Suggestion to ask Faith in Action to move to Maggie's office space and they could move their 2nd office to the counter's room. Maggie and counters would move into church office. Rooms for FIA would need to be painted and we have a volunteer. Timeframe after 1st of the year.

Secretary's report: Reviewed minutes from the 10/18/21 meeting. Motion made to approve by Rick Lohr; 2nd by Matt Munson. Minutes approved.

Forming LLC – Mark Munson joined the meeting and discussion was held about forming LLC so that we could rent out unused space in the building. Further discussion needed.

Treasurer report. Matt provided his report. Motion to approve and hold for audit made by Patti Busche & 2nd by Rick Lohr. Treasurer's report approved.

Financial Secretary report. Patti provided for Jane. Discussion held about creating a separate Contingency Fund and funds received from the East Central Synod would be placed in this category. Counter's sheets will need to be updated. Motion made by Judy Kort to approve and hold for audit; 2nd by Matt Munson. Financial Secretary's report approved.

Stewardship: 35 pledges received so far. Will provide list of volunteers from time and talent sheets to give to each committee chair. Will be sending out pledge reminders in 10 days.

Worship:

- Thanksgiving Eve service will be on 11/24 here at Immanuel. Will put out box of masks and urge all to wear for that service. Pie social will be held. Will have carryout boxes available.
- There will be no Wednesday night Advent services.
- Judy asked about remembering members who are alone for Thanksgiving. Will put notice in bulletin to call office if you would like to invite one of these members to your meal.

Unfinished Business:

- LLC formation – table until more direction.

New Business:

- Discussed custodian hours and payment. Agreed no changes need to current setup.
- Contingency fund discussed for extraordinary circumstances. Rick Lohr made a motion to set up a contingency fund to be used as needed. 2nd by Judy Kort.

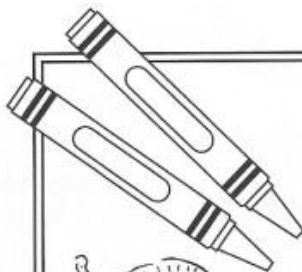

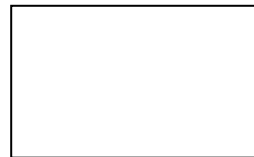
