"How can you afford to share your best seed corn with your neighbors? Don't they enter the same competition against your corn each year?" the reporter asked.



IMMANUEL'S PASTOR IN WORLD WAR I

The following account is taken from the centennial history of Immanuel from information that was researched and written by Harlan Grinde. Pastor Severin Thompson served Immanuel through much of the Great War after Pastor O.T. Boe resigned for health reasons in September of 1917. Thompson's relationship with the congregation was not a positive one. He had a large family and asked that more rooms be added to the parsonage, an expenditure that the congregation could not afford. He also asked that the congregation contribute to the Soldiers Fund and for the congregation to participate in the Federated Charities of Wausau. Again, the members of Immanuel felt that their budget simply did not allow it. Thompson spent considerable time serving on the Marathon War Fund committee, time that many members felt took away from his duties as pastor. Immanuel had 35 young men serving in the military, so its reticence in support of war time organizations was simply that the congregation did not have the funds. Near the end of his brief tenure the financial contributions were insufficient to pay the pastor's salary, and Thompson resigned in 1919. He threatened to sue the congregation if he did not obtain the salary owed to him. Immanuel finally managed to pay him the full amount, but the memory of his time at Immanuel was stained.
